The demand for PlayBoard's support, training and resources reaches beyond Northern Ireland, and increasingly includes the Republic of Ireland. Our profile and affiliations across the island of Ireland have grown in the last number of years, and we look forward to seeing this work develop further in the future.

## Opportunities for play

Increased profile, access and quality of play at a local level.

#### **Playwork practice**

The profile and professionalism of playwork has been enhanced, and training and practice has stimulated collaboration and cross-sectoral mobility within the children's workforce.

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#### Research & advocacy

Play is secured as an outcome in its own right within both the Children's Services Co-operation Act (2015) and Children and Young People's ten-year strategy. An increased evidence base on play and establishing good practice.



Working collectively has resulted in shared learning, a greater appreciation and understanding of play, and more effective and efficient play services.





Youth@Play builds the capacity of youth workers to facilitate play for their younger members in statutory youth settings. The project was supported by the Education Authority, with playwork training accredited by OCN NI.



"The Playwork course has really improved my confidence in what to do when it comes to play, and helping me better understand that child-led play is the best for the children. Before the course I got too involved and was planning play sessions ... whereas now I plan the play around the children, and they get to choose their own activities."

PlayBoard's Spaces to Be programme, delivered as part of the overarching OUR Generation project, advocates the use of play as a means of supporting the development of childhood resilience, and as a mechanism for positively addressing differences. OUR Generation is supported by the European Union's PEACE IV Programme, managed by the Special EU Programmes Body (SEUPB).



Children's feedback:

"The more I played the happier I was!" "The programme made me do things that I would never have got the chance to do like make stressballs and talking so much about my emotions. Now I've got an emotions chart I keep a tally of my feelings and after a while I show it to my mum."

### **Play in schools**

Through a combination of training and focused play development programmes, PlayBoard supports schools to develop and implement effective play strategies, enhancing growth, development and learning. Working with the whole school community, PlayBoard supports and enriches knowledge and understanding of play, whilst guiding development of the outdoor environment to maximise opportunities for play, leading to improved learning and play experiences.

Supported by the Department of Education (DE) as part of Covid-19 recovery:



10 primary schools achieved our TOPS Award.

10 primary schools received Positive PlayGrounds training.

"There is a greater variety of play and small equipment being used in the playground, fewer contentious incidents between pupils reported, better pupil interactions, and a more relaxed atmosphere in the playground". "Our outdoor play has been enhanced this year and our children have astounded us with their creativity and imaginative play. It has been particularly beneficial to the health and well-being of the older children in our school. The staff have embraced the changes whole-heartedly with the help and encouragement of the TOPS team."

### School-Age Childcare

PlayBoard delivers advice, support and training to the wider School-Age Childcare sector across Northern Ireland, whilst also providing targeted support to those groups who are funded through the NI Executive's Bright Start School-Age Childcare programme.

In addition to direct support, PlayBoard represents the interests of the sector at a strategic level through membership of relevant forums, and ongoing engagement with regional Health and Social Care Trusts and NI Executive Departmental officials. "I would definitely recommend to other professionals. A very valuable session, even for myself who has been in childcare for 25 years."

Delivered 25 cluster sessions to 250 participants exploring key issues impacting on quality of delivery within settings.



Delivered four webinars to Early Years practitioners through the Department of Education's Getting Ready to Learn programme.



Delivered 2 training sessions to 91 individuals representing 37 organisations, focused on building practitioners' knowledge and understanding of play.



**37 play resource packs** distributed containing play equipment and information resources.



Supported Bright Start funded groups with guidance on a range of issues including strategic development, fundraising, Minimum Standards compliance and governance.



### Councils

During the year, PlayBoard resumed delivery of face-to-face community play sessions (suspended during Covid-19) alongside the delivery of strategic support aimed at enhancing children's access to quality play opportunities.

In addition to area specific delivery, PlayBoard continues to provide secretariat support to the all council Play Development Officers' group. The group meets on a quarterly basis to share good practice and develop a cohesive support network across all council areas.

Research, advocacy, policy & engagement

PlayBoard continues to advocate for improved conditions for play and strives to put play firmly on the agenda of policy makers and resource providers at regional and local government level. Our research aims to inform, shape and influence practice and policy for children and families in Northern Ireland.




#### Presented internationally on our work at Play on Early Education conference
